on Pentecost, he's still using today
to attempt to delegitimize God's
promise of Joel 2.

“And it shall come to pass
afterward
That I will pour out My Spirit on all
flesh;
Your sons and your daughters shall
prophesy,
Your old men shall dream dreams,

Your young men shall see visions.
²⁹ And also on *My* menservants and
on *My* maidservants
I will pour out My Spirit in those
days.
And they shall prophesy.

And speaking of Peter...

he was a changed man!

Know this:

Pentecost was not so much about
tongues as it was about POWER!

But you shall receive power when
the Holy Spirit has come upon you;
and you shall be witnesses to Me
in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and
Samaria, and to the end of the
earth.”

But the manifestation of the Spirit is given to each one for the profit *of all*:⁸ for to one is given the word of wisdom through the Spirit, to another the word of knowledge through the same Spirit,

⁹ to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healings by the same Spirit, ¹⁰ to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another discerning of spirits, to another *different* kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues.

¹¹ But one and the same Spirit works all these things, distributing to each one individually as He wills.

“Our Father which art in heaven...”

Jesus is seated at the right hand of
God (many N.T. passages)

The Holy Spirit has been sent to us
to be a Helper, a Comforter, and a
Guide.

When the “promise” was given in
the O.T., God knew what He was
doing!

When Jesus said “wait”, He knew
what He was doing!

When the Holy Spirit is at work
today – He certainly knows what
He is doing!

Although there have been times when men have been overzealous, not used wisdom, and just been plain out of order – we dare not dismiss the working of the Holy Spirit in our lives today.

1 Corinthians 14 gives definite guidelines and instruction concerning the use of tongues in public worship. Paul's comments are very clear – he believed strongly in the gifts of the Spirit, stating that he frequently and often spoke (with tongues).

But he also acknowledged that the worshiper had an obligation, if need be, to control himself in public worship, for the good of others, but could yet be free in private worship to not be concerned with such restraint.

In the church, however, speaking with tongues should generally be interpreted, unless it is during a time of prayer, or as all are engaged in worship. Even then one should be cautious about bringing attention to oneself. This is the spirit of 1 Cor. 14, and is included in God's Word for our good.

Again, speaking in tongues, is not the main work of the Holy Spirit by any means. The power, conviction, assurance, fruit, and gifts of the Spirit all come from the One who was sent to be our help!

And God knows, we need help!
